

- Tariq Trotter aka Black Thought is a platinum-selling, Grammy-winning cofounder of The Roots and the author of *The Upcycled Self: A Memoir on the Art of* Becoming Who We Are.
- Trotter will be in conversation with Jason King, Dean of the USC Thornton School of Music.

TARIO TROTTER

Tariq Trotter is the lead MC of the hip hop band The Roots and a critically acclaimed solo artist, actor, writer, and producer. He has won four GRAMMY Awards and three NAACP Image Awards. The Roots have released more than a dozen albums and have been the house band on *The Tonight Show* for more than a decade. Trotter co-produced the original Broadway cast recording of *Hamilton* and starred in the Broadway musical *Black No More*.

Trotter was born in Philadelphia in 1973. *The Upcycled Self* is his first book.

VOCABULARY CORNER

upcycle — upcycling is creative reuse or recycling; the term is often used to describe transforming old clothing into new items, or creatively repurposing items that might otherwise be discarded

INFLUENCES

In a *New York Times Magazine* profile of Tariq Trotter, Reginald Dwayne Betts noted that Trotter cites these artists and thinkers among his influences:

Octavia Butler (1947–2006) — science fiction writer whose work is embraced by Afrofuturist, Black feminist, and other social justice visionaries; author of *Parable of the Sower* and *Parable of the Talents*, among many other books

Ralph Ellison (1914–1994) — writer, critic, and scholar best known for his novel *Invisible Man*

Frantz Fanon (1925–1961) — theorist, writer, and psychiatrist whose work and thought has deeply influenced anti-colonial and post-colonial thought and movements; author of *The Wretched of the Earth* and *Black Skin, White Masks*, among other books

Fela Kuti (1938–1997) — musician and activist who launched Afro-beat

Richard Wright (1908–1960) — writer who sparked the Black protest literary movement of the post-World War II era; author of the novel *Native Son* and the autobiography *Black Boy*, among other books


